## 5. Student Support and Progression

5.1 Contribution of IQAC in enhancing awareness about Student Support Services

NAAC Student Charter is displayed in the college.

The first year students of all courses are briefed by the IQAC coordinator about the NAAC accreditation Process.

The students are briefed on the student support services available in the college in the beginning of the academic year.

Student feedback is collected online using the software and necessary action is taken.

#### 5.2 Efforts made by the institution for tracking the progression

- Personal guidance, both in academic and non-academic matters, is made available through mentoring sessions, which is offered in the college at multiple levels. Besides course teachers, each class has a class teacher who also serves as a mentor whom the students can approach for academic and personal counselling. Each student meets her mentor, on a one-to-one basis, at least two times in a semester.
- Each mentor has a mentoring booklet where the personal and academic details of the students are recorded. Mentors offer academic counselling to students, help them choose open courses, recommend them for remedial coaching, if necessary and also meet parents of their mentees to update them on their progress.
- A systematic progress report is maintained which is a record of the internal performance of the student and regular parent-teacher meetings are conducted to review the academic performance of students.
- Alumni meet is being organised once in a year. Academic progression of students is tracked using social media and latest communication technologies.
- Students are promoted to visit library and assignment and projects are to be prepared based on library resources.

Faculty and staff positions are filled in keeping with the norms of the UGC, University of Calicut and the Government of Kerala. Sometimes there will be delay in filling retirement or leave vacancies from the part of government / university, guest faculty is appointed by the management.

Newly recruited staff members are given training by senior faculty members. Newly recruited administrative staff members are also given training.

Orientation and training programmes are periodically organised for all faculty.

Recreation programmes like staff tour, dinners, cultural activities are also organised for teaching and non-teaching staff.

#### 6.3.7 Faculty and Staff recruitment

The institution follows the UGC norms, University norms and Government of Kerala. Vacancies are advertised in leading newspapers and prescribed norms are strictly adhered to.

Selection Panel consists of Principal, members of management, Head of the concerned department and an external subject expert.

#### 6.3.8 Industry Interaction / Collaboration

Successful entrepreneurs are invited to the college to share their experience with the students.

Industrial visits like that to KINFRA and Tollin tyres were arranged.

The Department of Chemistry organised a two-day entrepreneurship programme for final year Bsc. students in association with department of physics.

#### 6.3.9 Admission of Students

The admission process is based on the philosophy that the access to quality education is the fundamental right of all the citizens. The college is committed to serving the economically and socially marginalised sections of society and this philosophy shaped the admission policy.

Students are admitted strictly based on the Govt. /University guidelines and regulations. The reservation policy of the Government, UGC and the University is implemented by the college. Accordingly, 50% seats are filled based on open merit, 20% reserved for SC/ST, 20% under Management Quota and 10% seats are filled under Community Quota. There is no provision to conduct entrance test for admission in to conventional programmes in affiliated colleges.

For conventional programmes, both at UG and PG levels, the admissions are done through a Centralized Admission Process (CAP) in which candidates apply online through university website. In general merit and reservation quota admissions are made from the allotment list of the university. The admissions under Management Quota, Community Merit, Cultural/Sports Quota, and Physically Handicapped Quota are done at college level from the merit list of each category. The merit/selection list will be published in the notice board/website. In case of complaints candidates can approach the Grievance Redressal Cell functioning in the College and University.

Even the students from Lakshwadeep island often choose the college due to lack of higher education facilities there
