

The profound fellow feeling of the Clarist Sisters paved the way for the starting of the college in 1980 by the Alvernia Province of Franciscan Clarist Congregation. The college is affiliated to the University of Calicut and is aided by the Government of Kerala. Located within the municipal limits of Chalakudy with a 26-acres serene campus, the college provides a congenial ambience for the overall advancement of the students. In 1991, the college was upgraded to a first grade college by the Government of Kerala.

At present the College offers 9 UG Programmes and 9 PG Programmes.

The college has extensive infrastructure to cater to the academic and non-academic needs of the student community. Well equipped laboratories, multimedia library, audio visual rooms, seminal halls, auditorium and a spacious playground are evidences to this.

POLICIES

Sacred Heartian Policies

Policies and procedures at Sacred Heart Women's College and designed to protect the rights and responsibilities of the students and the staff. These policies reflect its vision, mission and values

and underpin the teaching, learning interface and signals the institution's commitment to foster continuous improvement in education.

Policies are framed and periodically subject to review, reflection, revision and modification in an attempt to rise to the challenges and pressures higher education institutions face today.

<u>Internal Complaint Committee (ICC) - Policies and procedures</u>

Internal Complaints Committee

The Internal Complaints Committee was constituted in the college on 7th June 2017 in compliance with the instructions as per the UGC (Prevention, Prohibition and Redressal of Sexual Harassment of Women Employees and Students in Higher Educational Institutions) regulations. The ICC in association with the NSS unit and the Women's Cell give awareness classes on sexual harassment and abuse, legal measures etc. Staff and students are given freedom to report any such cases. Concerned authorities are notified if any such cases are reported.

Despite the preventive efforts made by the committee, if any incidents of sexual harassment take place, the registration of complaints shall follow the following procedures.

- Complaints can be lodged directly with any member of the committee. The person to whom the complaint is made should bring to the notice of the committee within 2 working days of receiving it.
- The complaint may be oral or written. If the complaint is oral it shall be made in written form by the committee or the member who has received the complaint with the signature of the complainant.

- 3. A complaint should be lodged within six weeks of the incident. In extraordinary circumstances, this could be
- 4. The committee shall study the complaint and may hear both the complainant and the accused and other involved parties to determine if an enquiry should be made. If so then an enquiry committee will be formed from the committee consisting of not less than 5 persons or not more than 7 persons. 70% of this committee will be from the women community.
- 5. The process shall be complainant friendly and quick in its decision regarding whether the matter needs to be enquired into or can be taken care of by counselling or mediation.
- 6. The complainant may withdraw his/her complaint in writing at any time while receiving or during enquiry procedure. In such case, the procedure shall be terminated. If the committee feels or has enough reason to believe that the withdrawal is the consequence or effect of cohesion/intimidation/threat, exerted by the accused or any person on his/her behalf, the enquiry proceedings shall continue.
- The enquiry committee shall complete the enquiry in the shortest possible time not exceeding 1 month from the date of registering the complaint.
- The enquiry committee shall provide reasonable opportunity to the complainant and the accused for presenting/ defending their case.
- 9. The enquiry committee shall then submit a detailed report to the main committee in which it shall communicate its findings based or already stadie willige

10. The main committee along with the enquiry committee will then forward its findings and recommendations to the management for further action.

Anti-Ragging Policy

Ragging is considered to be a criminal offence and is banned in the campus. The Anti-ragging Committee is constituted as per the provisions contained in Clause 6.3(a) of the UGC Regulations on Curbing the Menace of Ragging in Higher Educational Institutions in the year 2009. Anti-ragging cell functions in the campus with clearly defined norms as per UGC Regulations on Anti Ragging. Order of the Hon. Supreme Court on Ragging and UGC circulars on Anti Ragging. The purpose of the cell is to monitor the relationship between fresher and senior students. Orientations are given to the students by the Committee, class tutors and College Union Members. All the students are informed about the following administrative actions which will be taken if anyone is found guilty in ragging cases:

Suspension from attending classes and academic privileges.

 Withholding/withdrawing scholarship/fellowship and other benefits.

 Debarring from appearing in any test/examination or other evaluation process.

Withholding results.

 Debarring from representing the institution in any regional, national or international meet, tournament, youth festival, etc.

Suspension/expulsion from the hostel.

7. Cancellation of admission.

8. Rustication from the institution for period ranging from one to four semesters.

9. Expulsion from the institution and consequent debarring from admission to any other institution for a specified period.

10. In cases where the persons committing or abetting the act of ragging are not identified, the Institution shall resort

to collective punishment.

Grievance Redressal Policy

Strong principles and ethics are inextricably intertwined in the vision of the institution. Student grievances are addressed effectively through an active grievance redressal mechanism. A three-tier grievance mechanism is in place to solve any academic and administrative-related complaints as mandated by the Government. Ragging and sexual harassment is not tolerated by the institution. Institution strictly adheres to norms stipulated by the Government regarding ragging and sexual harassment.

 All students are bound by the code of conduct of the college.

 The college recognizes the right of a student to dissent and to fight for the legitimate rights of students.

 Any form of ragging, sexual harassment and use/ possession of narcotics/tobacco/alcohol shall be subject to severe punishment.

4. Abuse on social networking sites will be strongly dealt

with.

5. Any offence revealed in CCTV surveillance is punishable.

6. Any student detected in any incriminating situation both within inside and outside the campus shall be reprimanded and counselled.

 Students found violating the code of conduct shall be given a fair hearing at the departmental level and shall be suspended/dismissed only if deemed necessary.

Guidelines for Grievance Redressal Cell

The Grievance Redressal Cell is a strictly confidential cell functioning as an effective forum for airing the genuine grievances of students in academic, administrative, student services and other related matters.

Suggestions dropped in the grievance box are handled by the Principal who heads the Grievance Redressal Committee. This enables in the creation of a more student-

sensitive environment, better stakeholder relationships

and a congenial teaching-learning atmosphere.

 Class teachers, subject teachers and Heads are entrusted with the responsibility of dealing with grievances related to academic matters.

- Staff and student coordinators are assigned the task of solving any complaints related to clubs and associations.
- Any matter that cannot be resolved within the above frmework shall be referred to the Grievance Redressal Committee.
- Direct complaints can also be made in issues of common interest.
- The suggestion box can be used for grievances relating to any college-related matters.
- Issues that require immediate and serious action are attempted to be resolved by the Committee in consultation with the staff, management and parents.
- Prompt and effective redressal of complaints is ensured through the joint efforts of all the stakeholders.

Grievance Redressal Procedure

A three-level system has been established to deal with all student grievances.

Sacred Heart College

Class level: The student mentoring system is utilized to deal with any personal grievances.

Department level: Heads of departments and senior faculty resolve any complaints.

College level: The Grievance Redressal Committee is responsible to address any issues.

Extension Activity Policies

The college gives prominence to the extension and outreach activities as part of the intention of service and philanthropy towards the society. The college has been practising this for last ten years as a best practice called 'Heart to Heart'. This practice is followed by all the departments, clubs and cells to orient the extension activities to turn more beneficial for the community and to go in coherence with the policies of the college. The following are the general provisions in the policy.

- All the extension and outreach activities should involve students of the college. The programme should help in imbibing the spirit of service among the students.
- 2. The extension activities should help in building the society through the service of the college.
- Special care and consideration is to be given to the marginalised sections of the society including tribal, economically backward community etc.
- .4. Aged people should be given special attention when the services are offered.
- 5. NSS and other cells should follow the guiding principles of 'Heart to Heart'.

 Teaching staff should also participate in this programme and contribute in their own way to the community along with their academic exercise.

Environment and Energy Policy

Right from the inception of the college, our policy has evolved towards engaging students in a comprehensive, experiential and educational approach to all aspects of sustainability and reducing our reliance on fossil fuels. All policies are aimed at putting human ecology into action on campus and the local community, and in the process we find ourselves changing not only light bulbs but also our conception of what it means to be 'green'. Our policies echo our commitment to environmental and social justice that engages students, faculty and staff in the intellectual and practical life of the college.

The college has policies and affirmative action is taken to reduce our carbon footprint. Our long-term strategy is to champion conservation, follow an eco-friendly lifestyle by phasing out single-use plastics, reduce, recycle and compost waste, conserve energy and gradually shift to renewable resources and use non-toxic cleaning products. Green protocol of the State and Swachch Bharath Abhiyan are observed and promoted with focus on spreading and strengthening awareness.

The college has a policy framework for discarded resource reduction and material management like optimum paper usage, e-waste collection infrastructure, electronics repair and establishing a zero-waste culture on campus by integrating it into activities.

Policy Document for the Differently Abled

The college has enlisted the ensuing welfare and wellness policies and measures for the differently abled students.

1. The college prioritizes accessible and inclusive education with identical facilities for differently abled

students seeking admittance. The college puts in incessant efforts so as to make the college barrier free.

2. In affairs related to the acquisition of knowledge and further advancement of it, the library staff are instructed to give proper guidance to the disabledregarding the positionality of books that are arranged in racks with specific intents for easy access to varied bits of info.

3. All the differently abled students avail separate provision for examination assistance seeking the help of a scribe, selected from among the outstanding students.

4. Special care is also given to the students with special needs, set in the context of washroom setting and is ensured that the comfort stations are properly cleaned and well-maintained on a regular basis. The abled category of students is made conscious of the plight of the disabled and are also directed to escort the needy to the wash area as and when the situation demands.

 Ramp facility is made available in the self-financing block of the college that would further aid in the movement of the disabled in the desired direction.

6. The flooring pattern of the college is structured and designed to make it disabled friendly so as to ease the mobility and movement of individuals with disability that would also further enhance the comfort of their stature.

7. Methodical exertions are taken to intensify participation and involvement of differently abled students in Arts and Sports activities.

Policy Document for Financial Support

Financial Support policies of college, provides financial assistance to the poor and meritorious students in the college to

facilitate academic and personal welfare and encourage them to pursue their goals.

- The college provides merit based and need-based financial assistance.
- Merit based support goes to students based on their academic achievements and talents like athletics and arts, rather than their financial need.
- Students may receive scholarships from the college or from outside sources such as non-profit organizations and private businesses.
 - The college has the facility of providing various government and non-government scholorships to the students.
 - When awarding merit-based aid, college examines student's grades in both internal and university examinations and students may need to secure 75% marks in each semester to receive these funds.
 - Need-based financial assistance doesn't consider any factor other than financial background.
 - 7. Eligibility is completely based on the income of the student and her family. A student could be eligible if: she is living in a household where the joint annual income is less than 3 lakhs, she is living in a single parent household, or she is facing notable financial crisis even with an annual income more than 3 lakhs.
 - A Medical aid scheme is established by the management to provide financial assistance to the students having family income of less than 4 lakh per annum.
 - Financial support is given for staff to attend seminars and conferences, travel and registration.
 - Management has a free education policy for deserving and financially backward students.

Policy Document on Feedback Mechanism

The college has developed a sequence of impressive feedback mechanisms at various levels pertaining to different stakeholders to decipher whether the college functions satisfactorily in various dimensions and also whether its module operandi is in tune with the expectations of the associates concerned. The duly filled up feedback forms collected from all the stakeholders will then be forwarded to IQAC for close analysis. Every month the assorted and verified feedback analyses are systematically forwarded to the Principal for further validation and authentication of responses adhering to strict maintenance of confidentiality of received responses.

- 1. As teaching-learning processes form one of the pivotal essences in the functioning of an educational institution, to preserve the high quality of the noble domain of teaching that would further accentuate the advancement of learning process, each teacher's feedback is taken from the student community in each semester. All the class teachers concerned will distribute the forms amongst the students and the responses are further consolidated and submitted to IQAC for critical scrutiny. On the foundational basis of these analyses, the Principal designs apt steps to heighten the quality and standard of teaching-learning process in the college.
- Each faculty member of the college has to submit a monthly performance appraisal report documenting the progress graph of the academic and professional competency acquired hitherto with effect from the date of entry into service. This mode of stratagem serves as an effective feedback process by which both the institution and the faculty member concerned are to assess their levels of performance in varied fields of discipline.

- 3. The college maintains a Grievance Redressal Cell headed by the Principal and selected senior staff of the college to attend to the immediate needs and queries, deposited in a box by the students of the college, who are free enough to express their opinions and feedbacks on any matters related to their expectations. Due and immediate care is also taken to see whether their grievances are duly addressed on a timely basis.
- Annually, general body meetings of PTWA are held that function as platforms and floors for active discussions on ways of improvements based on the feedbacks received from the existing occupants of the college.

Policy Document for Information Technology

CHOICE BASED CREDIT AND SEMESTER SYSTEM FOR UNDER GRADUATE (UG) CURRICULUM 2019 (CBCSSUG 2019)

The "Regulations for Choice Based Credit and Semester System for Under Graduate Curriculum 2019" (CBCSSUG 2019) shall apply to all Regular/SDE/Private UG programmes under various Faculties conducted by the University of Calicut for the admissions commencing from 2019, with effect from the academic year 2019-2020. Every programme conducted under the CBCSS in a college shall be monitored by the College Council.

'Programme' means the entire course of study and examinations for the award of a degree. The duration of a UG degree programme shall be six semesters distributed in a period degree programme shall be six semesters distributed in a period of 3 years. 'Semester' means a term consisting of 18 weeks (16 of 3 years. 'Semester' means a term consisting of 18 weeks (16 instructional weeks and two weeks for examination). 'Course' means a segment of subject matter to be covered in a semester.

The Undergraduate Programme includes 5 types of Courses: viz; Common Courses (Code A), Core courses (Code B), Complementary courses (Code C), Open Course (Code D) and Audit courses (Code E).

- a) 'Common course' means a course that comes under the category of courses, including compulsory English and additional language courses, the selection of which is compulsory for all students undergoing UG programmes. Every UG student shall undergo 10 common courses (total 38 credits).
- b) 'Core courses' are the courses in the major (core) subject of the degree programme chosen by the student. Core courses are offered by the parent department.
- c) 'Complementary course' means a course which is generally related to the core course. Complementary courses cover one or two disciplines that are related to the core subject and are distributed in the first four semesters. There shall be two complementary courses in a semester for B.Sc Programmes and only one complementary course in a semester for B.A Programmes. The complementary courses in first and fourth semester for BA Programme (Type 1) shall be the same. Similarly the complementary courses in second and third semester (Type 2) shall be the same.
 - d) 'Open course' means a course which can be opted by a student at his/her choice from any other department in the

institution during the fifth semester. Total credit alloted for the open course is 3 and the hours allotted is 3. The open course shall be open to all the students in the institution except the students in the parent department.

e) 'Ability Enhancement course/Audit courses': These are courses which are mandatory for a programme but not counted for the calculation of SGPA or CGPA. There shall be one Audit course each in the first four semesters. These courses are not meant for classroom study. The students can attain only pass (Grade P) for these courses. At the end of each semester there shall be an examination conducted by the college from a pool of questions (Question Bank) set by the University. The list of courses in each semester with credits are given below.

Extra credit Activities: Extra credits are mandatory for the programme. Extra credits will be awarded to students who participate in activities like NCC, NSS and Swatch Bharath. Those students who could not join in any of the above activities have to undergo Calicut University Social Service Programme (CUSSP). Extra credits are not counted for SGPA or CGPA.

Credits: A student is required to acquire a minimum of 140 credits for the completion of the UG programme, of which 120 credits are to be acquired from class room study and shall only be counted for SGPA and CGPA. Out of the 120 credits, 38 (22 for common (English) courses + 16 for common languages other than English) credits shall be from common courses, 2 credits for project corresponding paper

and 3 credits for the open course. The maximum credit acquired under extra credit shall be 4. If more Extra credit activities are done by a student, that may be mentioned in the Grade card. The credits ofaudited courses or extra credits are not counted for SGPA or CGPA Attendance: A student shall be permitted to appear for the semester examination, only if he/she secures not less than 75% attendance in each semester. Attendance shall be maintained by the Department concerned. Condonation of shortage of attendance to a maximum of 10% in the case of single condonation and 20% in the case of double condonation in a semester shall be granted by University remitting the required fee. Benefits of attendance may be granted to students who attend the approved activities of the college/university with the prior concurrence of the Head of the institution. Participation in such activities may be treated as presence in lieu of their absence on production of participation/attendance certificate (within two weeks) in curricular/extracurricular activities (maximum 9 days in a semester). Studentscan avail of condonation of shortage of attendance in a maximum of four semesters during the entire programme (Either four single condonations or one double condonation and two single condonations during the entire programme) . If a student fails to get 65% attendance, he/she can move to the next semester only if he/she acquires 50% attendance. In that case, a provisional registration is needed. Such students can appear for supplementary examination for such semesters after the completion of the programme. Less than 50% attendance requires Readmission. Readmission is permitted only once during the entireprogramme.

Grace Marks: Grace marks may be awarded to a student for meritorious achievements in co-curricular activities (in Sports/Arts/NSS/NCC/Student Entrepreneurship) carried out besides the regular hours. Such a benefit is applicable and limited to a maximum of 8 courses in an academic year spreading over two semesters. In addition, a maximum of 6 marks per semester can be awarded to the students of UG Programmes, for participating in the College Fitness Education Programme (COFE).

REGISTRATION

1. A student shall be normally permitted to register for the examination if he/she has required minimum attendance. If the student has a shortage of attendance below 65% in a semester, the student shall be permitted to move to the next semester (if the attendance is more than 50% -Provisional registration) and can write the examination for the entire courses of the semester in which shortage of attendance occurs as supplementary examination only after the, completion of the entire programme. In such cases, a request from the student may be forwarded through the Principal of the college to the Controller of Examinations within two weeks of the commencement of the semester. If the attendance is less than 50%, the student is ineligible to continue the programme and has to seek readmission. There will not be any Repeat semester in CBCSSUG 2019.

2. A student who registered for the course shall successfully complete the programme within 6 years from the year of first registration. If not, such a candidate has to cancel the existing registration and join afresh as a new candidate.

EVALUATION AND GRADING

Mark system is followed instead of direct grading for each question. For each course in the semester letter grade and grade point are introduced in a 10-point indirect grading system.

An aggregate of P grade (after external and internal putogether) is required in each course for a pass and also for awarding a degree (A minimum of 20% marks in external evaluation is needed for a pass in a course. But no separate pass minimum is needed for internal evaluation). No separate grade mark for internal and external will be displayed in the grade card; only an aggregate grade will be displayed. Also the aggregate marks of internal and external are not displayed in the grade card. A student who fails to secure a minimum grade for a pass in a course is permitted to write the examination along with the next batch. After the successful completion of asemester. Semester Grade Point Average (SGPA) of a student in that semester is calculated using the formula

SGPA = Sum of the credit points all courses in a semester

Total credits in that semester

The Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA) of the student is calculated at the end of a programme. The CGPA of a student determines the overall academic level of the student in a programme and is the criterion for ranking the students. CGPA can be calculated by the following formula.

CGPA = Total credit points obtained in six semester Total credits acquired (120)

Course Evaluation

The evaluation scheme for each course shall contain two parts 1) Internal assessment 2) External Evaluation

20% weight shall be given to the internal assessment. The remaining 80% weight shall be for the external evaluation.

1) Internal Assessment: Components with percentage of marks of Internal Evaluation of Theory Courses are- Test paper 40%, Assignment 20%, Seminar 20% and Classroom participation based on attendance 20%.

For practical courses - Record 60% and lab involvement 40% as far as internal is concerned.

For the test paper marks, at least one test paper should be conducted. If more test papers are conducted, the mark of the best one should be taken.

To ensure transparency of the evaluation process, the internal assessmentmarks awarded to the students in each course in a semester shall be notified on the notice board at least one week before the commencement of external examination. There shall not be any chance for improvement for internal marks. The course teacher(s) shall maintain the academic record of each student registered for the course, which shall be forwarded to the University by the college Principal after obtaining the signature of both course teacher and Head of the Department.

2) External Evaluation

External evaluation carries 80% of marks. All question papers shall be set by the University. The external question papers may be of uniform pattern with 80/60 marks. The courses with 2/3 credits will have an external examination of 2 hours duration

with 60 marks and courses with 4/5 credits will have an external examination of 2.5 hours duration with 80 marks. The external examination in theory courses is to be conducted by the University with question papers set by external experts. The external examination in practical courses shall be conducted by two examiners — one internal and an external, the latter appointed by the University. The project evaluation with viva can be conducted either internal or external which may be decided by the Board of Studies concerned.

RULES OF ADMISSION

 Admission of students for the UG and PG Programmes will be under Choice Based Credit Semester System.

At the time of interview the applicant should produce the following certificates in original.

(i) Transfer Certificate from the school/college last attended.

(ii) Course and Conduct Certificate.

(iii) Mark List and Pass Certificate (P.G. students have to submit the degree/diploma in original at least by September of the same year).

3. Immediately after the interview, the candidate if selected will be enrolled on payment of the 1st instalment of fees and

the submission of the certificates.

 Students are advised to have with them sufficient number of attested copies of their mark list and other documents before the original certificates are submitted to the office.

COLLECTION OF FEE

Fees are collected as per the Governmental rules.

- a. The Tuition fees including the special fees prescribed will be collected on the date of admission.
- b. If any student fails to pay the fees or special fees on the due date, she shall be liable to pay a fine of Rs. 5/- along with the fees on or before the 10th day, after the due date. If the 7th day, happens to be a holiday, the next working day will be counted as the 7th day.
- after the due date, an additional fine of Rs. 10/- will have to be paid. If the fee and fines are not paid within 15 days from that date, the name of the student will have to be removed from the rolls of the college. If she is to be re-admitted, she has to apply for the special permission of the Principal and also has to remit a re-admission fee of Rs. 100/- in addition to the arrears with fine.
- d. If the fee and fines are not paid on the 11th day or within 15 days, from that date the name of the student will be entered in a special register of defaulters. The attendance of the student would be taken every day as usual and her attendance or absence would be marked. If the student settles the arrears of fees with fines before last opportunity given for such a settlement, she would be granted attendance as per actual presence or absence as record. If the student does not pay the dues till the last date prescribed, she would not be allowed to appear for the examination.

INSTITUTIONAL CODE OF ETHICS

 The institution adheres to a conduct of duties in a righteous manner and in accordance with the principles of honesty, trust, transparency and fairness.

 The institution should balance the diversity and difference through a culture of tolerance, discussion and forgiveness

among stakeholders.

 The institution should adopt standards, policies and procedures to promote and ensure equal opportunity without any discrimination.

 Dedication to the vision and mission of the institution while cultivating one's knowledge, skill and attitudes to achieve

excellence within the regulatory boundaries.

 The institution must foster a shared vision and ensure a secure, safe environment where all stakeholders feel included and accepted.

 The institution should ensure optimal resource utilisation – economic, environmental and social – to achieve a

sustainable future.

CODE OF CONDUCT FOR STUDENTS

1. The regulations aimed to secure a good order, necessary for the effective pursuit of knowledge, help the students attain the level of quality work required of them and ensure proper development of the whole person.

2. The students' registration in the college is considered an expression of willingness to abide by all the rules and

- regulations prevailing in the college. Every student therefore is committed to the observance of these rules.
- 3. The Code of Discipline exists primarily to provide the discipline necessary for an academic environment. The management has the right to suspend /dismiss any student for breach of discipline.

Important notices are posted on the respective notice boards.
 It is the responsibility of the students to read these notices and to respond immediately if summoned.

 It is the responsibility of the student to treat college property with care and to keep the buildings and the campus neat and clean.

All students should read and understand library regulations.

 Students are advised to make use of the library during free periods. Those who prefer to sit in the classroom for doing academic work will not in any way cause disturbance to the neighbouring class.

8. Political activism is strictly banned in the campus, as it is detrimental to the teaching learning process. (Vide: W.A. No. 535 of 2003- Judgement dt. 26/5/2003 of the Honourable High Court of Kerala).

Nevertheless, the college recognizes the right of a student to dissent and to fight for the legitimate rights of students. However, these rights should not fringe upon the rights of other students to attend class and/or of the teacher to conduct his/her lessons. Students shall not take out demonstrations along the corridors or enter the classrooms and obstruct the teaching process.

Students are strongly advised to prefer modesty to fashions.
They are allowed to wear only the uniforms specified by the
college on all days.

 Students should not wear gold ornaments except a pair of earrings.

11. Mobile phones are not allowed on campus for students.

 The college ID Card should be worn daily and surrendered after the completion of the course or if the student discontinues.

GENERAL DISCIPLINE

- Every student shall behave and conduct herself in the college and in the hostel in a dignified and courteous manner and should be respectful to the teachers.
- Consumption of narcotic drugs, tobacco, alcohol etc. are strictly prohibited in the campus and in the hostel and action will be initiated against those who are found to have consumed them.
- Students are prohibited from indulging in anti-institutional, anti- national, anti-social, communal, immoral or political expressions and activities within the campus and hostel.
- 4. Learning not to damage property whether public or private is one of the primary requirements for civilized behaviour. Students shall not disfigure, damage or destroy public or college properties. In the event of such damage or destruction the cost of such properties will be recovered from the student or students concerned. Disciplinary action will also be taken against the delinquents.
- Silence shall be maintained in the college library and in the premises of the office.
- Unauthorized entry of outsiders into the campus as well as to the hostel is strictly prohibited. Without specific permission of the authorities, students shall not bring outsiders to the college or to the hostel.
- 7. No one shall bring, distribute or circulate any notice, pamphlet, leaflet etc. within the campus or the hostel. The possession, distribution or exhibition of any object which is obscene within the campus or the hostel is also an actionable offence.
- Nobody shall exhibit any type of banners, flags, boards etc. inside the campus gates and on the compound walls.

Similarly, students are prohibited from disfiguring the walls of the college building. No student shall collect money either by request or by coercion from others within the campus or the hostel except with the specific permission of the Principal.

 Students are strictly prohibited from organizing, attending or participating in any activity or agitation sponsored by the

politically based student organizations.

10. The college being a temple of learning and an exclusive academic zone, nobody shall involve in any form of strike or agitation including slogan shouting, dharna, gherao, burning in effigy or indulge in anything which may harm the peaceful and serene atmosphere of the institution and shall eschew from violence within the campus and the hostel.

11. Any student who is found to exert undue influence on fellow students will be strictly dealt with. No student is allowed to enter classes of other batches when the class is in session.

 No student will enter or leave the classroom when the session is ongoing without the permission of the teacher.

13. Students availing leave for more than ten working days without submitting proper leave applications will have their names removed from the rolls. They may be readmitted only at the discretion of the Principal.

14. Usage of cell phones within the campus is prohibited. Violation of the ban would entail seizure of the same with

fine.

15. There is a Students' Grievance Redressal Cell in the college. In case the students have any grievance or complaint they may approach the Head of the Department first and if not satisfied, the Principal. The Principal will, at her discretion refer the matter to the Students' Grievance Redressal Cell consisting of the Vice- Principal (or an impartial senior

- teacher), one HoD and one senior teacher (Selection Grade/ Reader/Associate Professor) nominated by the Principal.
- 16. Students who are charged with a criminal offence or are under suspension will not be allowed to enter the college campus without the permission of the Principal.

17. The Principal has the power to declare holiday for the college if she finds the peaceful academic functioning of the college is getting seriously affected.

18. Any case of criminal activity or violation of law and order in the college campus will be reported to the police and the police shall register a case and initiate action against the offenders.

19. The terms and conditions of admission and the code of conduct are included in the college calendar issued to the students and are binding on the students. In the application form, an undertaking shall be given by the student and the parent.

20. In the matter of internal discipline, the decision of the

Principal shall be final.

 Students should not throw litter in the campus, rather place them only in the waste bins. Students are bound to keep the campus neat and clean.

 Students are expected to be properly dressed. Women students are expected to show lady-like dignity in their dress

and general behaviour.

23. Students are not permitted to drive their vehicles into the

prohibited area of the campus.

24. Any student who is persistently insubordinate, who is repeatedly or wilfully mischievous, who is guilty of fraud or malpractice in connection with examinations or who, in the opinion of the Principal, is likely to have an unhealthy influence on her fellow students, shall be removed from the rolls. The removal shall be either temporary or permanent according to the gravity of the offence.

25. The students are expected to rise from their seats when the teacher enters the classroom and are supposed to remain standing till he/she takes his/her seat or till they are instructed to sit down. They are also expected to greet when the teacher enters/leaves the classroom.

26. Nothing is more appreciated in a student than courteous and mannerly behaviour. The students are expected to greet the teachers when they meet them inside and outside the campus. Please note that it is a rude behaviour to enter a room without being asked to and not to say 'Thank you' when something is done for you.

27. Students are expected to spend their free hours in the Library/ Reading Room. They should not loiter along the verandas or crowd at the gate or in the campus road.

28. In order to ensure a congenial academic atmosphere in the campus, the election process shall be in the parliamentary form of indirect election. The college parliament will be constituted with the representatives elected from each classes and the college parliament will in turn elect the college level and university level office bearers.

PROFESSIONAL ETHICS FOR FACULTY

- Faculty members should adhere to a responsible pattern of conduct and demeanour.
- Faculty should respect the right/dignity of the student in expressing her opinion.
- Faculty must recognise the differences in aptitudes and capabilities of students and strive to meet their individual needs.
- Faculty should encourage students to improve their attainments, develop their personalities and simultaneously contribute to community welfare.

- 5. Faculty should behave in an affectionate manner to the students and refrain from any sort of vindictive behaviour.
- 6. Faculty should be available and approachable to students even outside class hours.
- Faculty should seek to make professional growth continuously through study and research.
- g. Faculty should perform their duties in the form of teaching, tutorial, practical and seminar work conscientiously and with dedication.

ASSOCIATIONS, CLUBS & FORUMS

Sacred Heart College acknowledges that development and growth of an individual does not take place in the classroom alone. Development of talent and skills is essential for the integral formation of the personality of a student. With this insight, the college has a number of associations, clubs and forums. A student can join any number of these according to her taste/talents. There will be a faculty coordinator for each body who will be in charge of its overall supervision.

Statutory Associations

1. The College Union

Student participation in the activities of the college is enhanced by the formation of the College students union comprising of elected representatives of the Students. College Union is a body selected every year by the students through an election process and its tenure is one year. The election of the office bearers of the union is coducted on Democratic norms observing University rules. There is a College Union Advisor who is a senior member of the faculty. The union involves in conducting various extra curricular and co-curricular activities. They discuss various matters with the union, staff advisor and principal. Election to the College Union is conducted every year when affiliating University issues orders in this regard. At present the College follows the Parliamentary system of election as per the provision of the orders of Honourable Supreme Court of India, Honourable High Court of Kerala, J M Lyngdoh Committee recommendations and the schedule issued by the affiliating universities of Kerala.

2. Subject Associations

In subjects where the instructions are offered as main, the college has subject associations. Each subject association has an elected Secretary and will function as per the guidelines issued by the head of the department. The broad objective of the associations is to give students exposure to the subject beyond textbooks by organizing lectures, debates, quizzes etc.

3 National Service Scheme (NSS)

The college has two units of NSS, unit No. 76 nd 84. It aims at education through community service. It is intended to arouse the social conscience of the student by preparing them to be useful to society.

Motto of NSS: Healthy Youth for Healthy India The specific objects are to provide them

- a. To work with and among the people.
- b. To engage in non-violent constructive social action.
- c. To enhance their knowledge of themselves and the community through a confrontation with reality.
- d. To put their scholarship to practical use in mitigating at least some of the social problems.
- e. To practice democratic leadership.

Membership in NSS is voluntary and is strictly on selective basis. Each student is subject to its discipline and code of behaviour. Every student attending NSS will be required to put the minimum of time equivalent to 120 hours each academic year including the hours of work put in during the camp days. Those who complete 240 hours of work in 2 years and attend the 7-day camp are eligible for a certificate issued by the University.

Application for enrolment will be called for by the programme officer of the unit at the beginning of each academic year.

Membership in NSS and a certificate to that effect from the University will be treated as additional qualification while making recruitments to public services.

PARENT TEACHER WELL-WISHERS ASSOCIATION

This association is established to create an atmosphere of friendship, co-operation and unity among the guardians of students, faculty members and well wishers of the college in matters pertaining to functioning of the college and to foster feeling of unity in all spheres of development of the college.

ALUMNAE ASSOCIATION

The college has an Alumnae Association to continue the Sacred Heart Fraternity after completing education from the college. The association also aims at tapping the potential of its alumni for the enhancement of the institution.

The annual meeting of the Alumnae Association will be conducted every year on the Second Saturday in the month of July.

HOSTEL FACILITIES

Hostel facilities are available. Those who would like to stay in the hostel should apply for it in the prescribed form. Please be noted that the students are allowed to stay only in our college hostel.

LIBRARY RULES & REGULATIONS

- Only the members of the staff & students of this college are entitled to the use of library.
- The library is kept open from 8.00 a.m. to 5.00 p.m. on all working days. Books should be returned before 1.00 p.m.
- Students are allowed to take only paper and pen in the library.
 Other books, umbrellas etc. should be left at the entrance.
- Strict silence must be observed in the library and its immediate premises, especially in the library veranda.
- 5. A student in degree class is allowed to borrow three books and PG students 10 books at a time and borrower's tickets will be issued accordingly, which are not transferable. One book can be borrowed against each ticket. When the book is returned to the library, the tickets will be given back.
- Students are expected to take care of the tickets and slips issued to them. If a ticket or slip is lost, a duplicate will be issued on payment of fine as fixed by the librarian.

- 7. Students shall return their tickets at the close of the course of study. Those who discontinue the course should return their ticket (ID Card) before applying for T.C. Fine would be levied for the misuse of library tickets.
- Members are not permitted to sub lend the books or ticket issued to them.
- Students are permitted to walk amidst the bookshelves and to take any book to the reading table. After reading, they shall leave the books on the reading table so that books may not be misplaced. A book misplaced is virtually a book lost.
- 10. Books should be handled with great care. Please wrap the books when you use them. Pencil marks and ink stains made in books, destruction of binding, tearing of pages or pictures etc. will invite fine. Before leaving the counter, students must examine the books borrowed and report to the library staff any damage found therein. If they fail to do so, they will be held responsible for any damage detected afterwards.
- Subject books and fiction are issued for 14 days. An overdue charge of Rs. 1/- for subject books and fiction shall be levied after two week.
- 12. Damage to or loss of books on loan should be immediately reported to the librarian. Members may replace such books or pay the damages as fixed by the librarian. Books will not be issued to such members till the loss has been compensated.
- 13. The librarian can recall from the borrower any book at any time.
- Once a book is issued, it will not be taken back on the same day. renewals are not permitted.
- 15. Readers must be considerate to others. Kindly leave the magazines, journals or papers, back in their respective places

- thus making it convenient to other readers. Damage to these will be treated seriously.
- 16. Dictionaries, encyclopaedias, current periodicals and other reference books shall not be lent out.
- Students are expected to return all library books before they leave for their revision holidays.
- 18. The staff members are not allowed to lend the library books to those outside the college.
- 19. At the end of the academic year, all the members of the staff are expected to return all the books and periodicals borrowed at least three days before the closing date.
- 20. Internet access to students are meant only for study purpose. They are free to use internet for Assignment and Project Work. One hour for PG students and 30 miniuts for UG students per day.
